


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LETTER FROM JESS

PROJECT HIGHLIGHTS

Projects form the foundation of YCore's program. We partner teams of 4-5 young professional fellows with local nonprofits to work on a 4-month strategic project. Our fellows apply their professional skills to a challenge their partner is facing, dedicating after-work hours to bring solutions to life.

Some highlights of our 2021 projects are:



Data & Web

Strengthen data infrastructure and practices to better understand real-time tenant needs and inform advocacy and programs.

Create a web process for youth to participate in events, helping them track and deepen their relationship to the national parks.



Marketing & Research

Create new marketing materials for a campaign for capital funding to improve land management.

Provide competitive analysis and strategic research to bolster a successful expansion to neighboring states.



Strategy

Conduct a market analysis and internal needs assessment to align the organization's efforts with the needs of the larger community.

Research and create a manual for Advisory Board recruitment, engagement, and best practices.



Programs

Create content and launch plans for early-career development programs.

Evaluate existing programming to increase efficiency and quality during an expansion period.

Enhance volunteer retention through understanding volunteers' experiences & streamlining communication.



WORKSHOP HIGHLIGHTS

While working on their projects, fellows attend bi-weekly workshops to explore their relationship to privilege and social impact and build skills to make them more effective volunteers and donors.



Our Core Curriculum

Our workshops cover topics like conducting empathy interviews, fundraising, an introduction to systems thinking, and exploring values and purpose in social justice work.



New Content for a New Era

In 2021, we debuted a new workshop: "What does 'giving back' mean?" that explores the different ways we think about the responsibility we have to each other.



Virtual Projects in New Cities

The flexibility of virtual workshops allowed us to pilot two projects in Denver, CO and welcome fellows living in San Francisco, Silicon Valley, Denver, New York, Seattle, and Los Angeles.

Many are considering or already in the process of a career transition, seeking to align their work with their values.





RACIAL AND INDSTRY MAKEUP OF YCORE FELLOWS



YCore Alumni

Our program alumni donate 3x more annually than they did before the program, almost 7x more than the average for millennial adults.

YCore alumni also volunteer 1.3x more hours than they did before the program, 2.5x the national average for millennials

- Donating to mutual aid efforts in their communities
- Accepting jobs at equity-focused companies and/or transitioning to social-sector jobs full time

LOOKING AHEAD

Based on the feedback of our fellows, alumni, and nonprofit partners, we plan to use the next five years to work deeper and wider. We are designing new curricula to help young professionals continue the journey they began in our core program, and we're expanding our program to new cities across the U.S.



Grow Beyond the Bay

After two pilot projects in Denver, CO, we'll kick off 2022 with projects in NYC and Dallas. Our goal is to continue offering a remote version of YCore's core program to nonprofits and professionals across the country while working towards a second full-time location in the next few years.



Pilot New Programming

We are designing new curricula to help young professionals continue the journey they began in our core program, beginning with pilots in 2022 focused on giving, education, and volunteering.



Keep Our Partners Front and Center

We're getting clearer about our partnership objectives and prioritizing community-based organizations focused on advancing equity and justice. At the same time, we're designing processes to be more responsive to our repeat nonprofit partners and new partners alike.
